

I have been able to get a much better picture Another decision?? Several people commented that the public has of the sentiment and wishes of the district's patrons.

In my opinion, this was the most important question presented. system, whether that be with teachers, administrators, other staff, When asked about dissolution of the district, 53% opposed or strongly ideas, and yes, facilities. Whomever is on the Board will always have opposed closing it. Another 28% neither supported or opposed a responsibility to keep asking the questions, until they come up with dissolving, and there were 19 % who stated they supported a solution that can be supported by the majority of its patrons. or strongly supported closing the district. This is such important information for many reasons, mostly there are many people living in the district who are full of Wildcat pride, and do not want to see their school district closed. As you move forward with making decisions about what is best for your students and communities, knowing that 81% do not support or strongly support closing the district, you will always know that most of your neighbors believe the school district should remain open and effective. With that said, what else have I learned from the survey? The most obvious answer was there are many people who think the district needs a new high school, just not in Americus. Most of the comments stated if the district builds a new building it should be centrally located. There is also support for renovating the current buildings.

If we combine the phone poll and the web survey, 79% said the most important thing we should do is build a new high school (just not in Americus). Renovating the current high school had support of 59% and renovating the elementary school had 63% approval. Some comments included, "One roof for all centrally located, Current buildings are just fine, Don't put lipstick on a pig, Seems silly to add on when a whole new K-12 building is needed, Too much money," and they went on and on for 62 pages!

Some of the comments mentioned that you shouldn't build any new buildings because eventually the district will get too small to remain open. I have to disagree with that sentiment. You have 347 students now. Even if you would lose 150 students over the next several years, the district would still remain larger than MANY districts across Kansas, including several in this area. I do not see the district ever getting to the point where it would need to close or consolidate, so I don't think that statement has validity.

So what should we do next? I am an interim superintendent with no dog in this hunt, so I am going to give you my opinion based on 25 years of school administration. I believe deeply that it is the responsibility of the adults in the community to provide our youth the best educational opportunities available, including facilities that will help them thrive. Our parents and grandparents did that for us and now it is our turn.

It is clear that the facilities in this district are subpar and need updated. The current buildings can be renovated to be adequate for several years. However, I believe you will eventually need to replace both buildings with new, whether that is in 2 years or 12 years. The question remains, when and where should that occur.

Over the next 18-24 months I will give you options that include renovations to current facilities with existing money, and plans for building a centrally located 6-12 building, with an option to include a Pre-K-5 addition onto the 6-12 building. Any new building should be modestly built to address needs and not spectacular or stunning, keeping costs as low as possible. These plans will include exactly

5 Ways to Stop Spam Calls

Do-it-yourself defenses that can be used for automated & live spam calls.

1 Answer with silence. When you say hello or anything else, automated voice-activated calls launch the robocall recording or transfer you to a call center, where a live operator angles for personal and financial information. But saying nothing usually disconnects these calls within seconds, with no robo-message or callbacks from that phony number. If it is an unsolicited "live" caller, wait for that person to speak to break the silence. If you don't recognize the voice, hang up. 2 Try a "not in service" recording. Using a portable tape recorder and a microphone attached to a handset, copy a "this number is not in service" message to play during a callback to a scammer's spoofed number.

3 Trap 'em with an app. Smartphone users have plenty of options that flag and block some fraudulent calls and text messages. Some services are free; others cost a few bucks per month. Customers of AT&T can use Call Protect, Verizon Wireless provides Caller Name ID, Sprint offers Premium Caller ID, and T-Mobile has Scam ID and Scam Block. You can also buy apps like YouMail and RoboKiller that will filter calls for a few bucks a month — or for free in the case of Youmail.

Another freebie for landline user: Press *77 to block "anonymous" and "private" numbers, then deactivate it anytime with *87.

To block numbers that get through on an iPhone, open the phone app, tap the circled "i" icon to the right of the spam number that called, scroll down and tap Block This Caller. For Android smartphones, open the phone app and tap the calling number, select Details, then Block Number.

4 Know which calls to avoid. The most common calling cons are pitches that promise to reduce debt and credit card rates or to get you preapproved loans; offer free or low-cost vacations, time-shares, home security systems and medical supplies; or come from government and utility company impostors.

5 A dropped or "one-ring" call is a common ruse to prompt a callback. Beware of area codes 268, 284, 809 and 876, which originate from Caribbean countries with high per-minute phone charges. Robocalls tend to be highest on Friday and Tuesday, and the most frequently targeted numbers are in Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas, New York City, Los Angeles, Houston, Birmingham, Ala., and Miami.





What is Text-to-911?

Who knew texting could be so helpful??? Recently, LCECC has gained the ability to host the Text-to-911 system for emergencies— and it is as easy as it sounds!

However, it is always encouraged to call if you can, text if you can't!

Just follow these simple steps:

- 1. Enter "911" in the "To" Field
- 2. The first text message to 9-1-1 should be brief and contain the location of the emergency and the type of help needed Example: "518 Mechanic St Emporia. Need police for fight."
- 3. Send!

Please keep in mind:

• Be prepared to answer questions and follow the instructions from the 911 dispatcher on the receiving end.

• Text in simple words - do not use abbreviations or slang.

• Keep text messages brief and concise – as with all text messages, 911 texts can take longer to receive than a phone call. Additionally, multiple texts can be received out of order or not at all. So keeping succinct is important!

- Text-to-911 is not available if you are roaming.
- A text or data plan is required to place a Text-to-911

• If Text-to-911 is not available in your area, or is temporarily unavailable, you will receive a message indicating such, and to contact 911 by other means.

- Photos and videos cannot currently be sent to Text-to-911
- Text-to-911 messages cannot include multiple recipients. Do not send your emergency text to anyone other than 911.



As I write this it is Holy Saturday. I think back to the last few days as we remembered Jesus on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. At the Last Supper he gathered with his friends, his beloved, as they share their final meal together. We also remembered the events that happened in rapid succession over the next 24 hours as Jesus was betrayed, arrested, denied, tried & amp; convicted (even though he was innocent) and crucified on Good Friday. 

USD 251 board selects new owner for Reading Elementary building, property. KVOE News

by Chuck Samples, May 19th. Reading Elementary has new owner. On Friday night, the USD 251 North Lyon County Board of Education unanimously approved a \$20,000 offer from Lions LLC. Additional details about the purchase, including potential ideas for the property's use, are currently pending.

Superintendent Mike Mathes says the district was hoping to get \$20,000 for the property. Lions was the first of two bidders for the property after the district listed the grounds for sale last month.

USD 251 closed Reading last year, partly as a way to close a roughly \$200,000 budget hole but also reflecting population trends and resulting transportation challenges for the district. The school, built in the 1870s, had faced an uncertain future since the 1990s, according to staff. Reading became the second district school to close this decade after Admire Elementary closed in 2010.

Stay away from downed power lines, and avoid flooded areas power lines could be submerged and still live with electricity. Don't enter seriously damaged buildings and avoid using matches and lighters in case of gas leaks.


