Reading Long Term Recovery Committee

One of the recent projects of the Reading Long Term Recovery committee has been the purchase of a "Benchmark" bench from the Van Go project in Lawrence, Ks. Each summer, Van Go pairs 20 apprentice-artists with local businesses and agencies to design custom art benches. After consulting with the clients, the apprentice-artists design, build, and paint a custom bench for public display. Reading will be the recipient of a beautiful Benchmark bench.

The Reading bench was designed and painted by apprentice-artist Bryan Clemons, a sophomore at Lawrence High School. The benches were unveiled on Friday, July 20 and is shown here with its creator. The title is "Rebuilding Reading - Small Town With a Lot of Heart." The bench will be brought back to Reading in the near future and be housed in City Hall until the new Community Building is erected.



City of Reading

The September 6, 2012 City Council meeting was called to order at 7:04 p.m. by Mayor Kevin Sorensen. Council members in attendance were Jenifer Hanneman, Todd Hensley, Heather Jones, Bill Paige and Ed Sapp.

City employees in attendance were Joyce Wilson and Marion Jones. Guests were: Reading Long Term Recovery Committee chairperson Mike Dorcey, Bruce Boettcher and Dan Hall of BG Consultants, Inc., and three residents.

Mike Dorcey announced that the final meeting of the Reading Long Term Recovery committee is set for 6 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 13 at the Miracle Café and all council members and spouses are invited. The committee first met on June 20, 2011 and has met regularly since then. Steve Burnett of United Methodist Kansas East Conference Disaster Relief provided a critical role in getting the various funders on board. Hundreds of volunteers had provided over 9,000 hours of volunteer labor providing a variety of tasks which saved the city over \$150,000. The committee has dispensed funds of approximately \$250,000 from funders who sat on the committee. The McCarthy group auction raised around \$60,000 which provided seed money for the two Habitat for Humanity homes. The committee also assisted the Kansas Rehabilitation Housing Grant administrator in identifying households eligible for the approved \$250,000 grant to repair homes in Reading. Much appreciation was expressed by the Council to Mike and the committee for all of their efforts and especially to Steve Burnett for his work on behalf of the Reading community.

Questions from attending residents in regard to Community Building costs, meter readings, property taxes, and culvert repairs were addressed by the mayor. Advertisements for the Community Building bids will be made in the near future with bids to be opened and read at 10 a.m. on Thursday, October 4. These will be enacted upon at the next City Council meeting at 7 p.m. October 4.

The community sign is up and running thanks to Heather Jones for her diligence in getting it set correctly. The temperature gauge is still inaccurate and should be updated corrected soon. Landscaping around the sign was discussed. Additional playground installation continues at the park and much appreciation is due to the families of Todd Hensley, as well Eugene and Lucus Senft.

The city will list both the RV spots as well as the Community Building in the 2013 Emporia Visitors Guide. The roll off dumpster was discussed and it was decided to leave it in place for at least one more month. Recent bids for the water tower partial repainting and rod tightening were discussed as well as the necessary repairs needed to the backhoe. The tree project delivery and distribution dates were discussed. Council meeting adjourned at 9:55 p.m.

City Clerk, Carol Ann Higgins, has returned to work after knee surgery recovery. Work began on city street repair on September 13.



Here are some ways parents can help their child stay on the road to success by being drug free. Explain to your child there are many things to look forward to,



both today and in the future. There are many choices to make, and being drug free makes it easier to choose wisely.

Review the facts about drug use and abuse with your child. Discuss your family's values about drugs and obeying the law.

Encourage your child to take responsibility for saying "NO" to drugs and "YES" to healthy fun activities.

Set an example for your child by maintaining healthy habits in your everyday life by serving as a role model.



Foods that Are Dangerous for My Pet

A number of human foods are dangerous to pets. Many of these foods may seem tasty to our pets but can prove deadly if eaten. It can be very tempting to offer pets food from the table, but pets should not be given human food unless recommended by your veterinarian. If you suspect your pet may have eaten a dangerous food, contact your veterinarian immediately. In many cases, early recognition and treatment are critical.

Xylitol is an artificial sweetener found in products such as gum, candy, mints, toothpaste, and mouthwash. Xylitol is harmful to dogs because it causes a sudden release of insulin in the body that leads to hypoglycemia (low blood sugar). Xylitol can also cause liver damage in dogs. Within 30 minutes after eating, the dog may vomit, be lethargic (tired), and/or be uncoordinated. However, some signs of toxicity can also be delayed for hours or even for a few days. Xylitol toxicity in dogs can be fatal if untreated. It is unknown whether xylitol is toxic to cats.

Chocolate contains theobromine, a chemical that is toxic to dogs in large enough quantities. Chocolate also contains caffeine, which is found in coffee, tea, and certain soft drinks. Different types of chocolate contain different amounts of theobromine and caffeine. For example, dark chocolate and baking chocolate contain more of these compounds than milk chocolate does, so a dog would need to eat more milk chocolate in order to become ill. However, even a few ounces of chocolate should be considered "safe" for a dog to eat. Chocolate toxicity can cause vomiting, diarrhea, rapid or irregular heart rate, restlessness, muscle tremors, and seizures. Death can occur within 24 hours of ingestion.

Grapes and raisins can cause acute (sudden) kidney failure in cats and dogs. It is unknown what the toxic agent is in these fruits. However, clinical signs can occur within 24 hours of eating and include vomiting, diarrhea, and lethargy (tiredness). Other signs of illness relate to the eventual shutdown of kidney functioning.

The avocado tree leaves, pits, fruit, and plant bark are likely all toxic. Clinical signs in dogs and cats include vomiting and diarrhea.

Garlic and onions contain chemicals that damage red blood cells in cats and dogs. Affected red blood cells can rupture or lose their ability to carry oxygen effectively. Cooking these foods does not reduce their potential toxicity. Fresh, cooked, and/or powdered garlic and/or onions are commonly found in baby food, which is sometimes given to animals when they are sick, so be sure to read food labels carefully.

Macadamia nuts are common in candies and chocolates. The mechanism of macadamia nut toxicity is not well understood, but clinical signs in dogs include depression, weakness, vomiting, tremors, joint pain, and pale gums. Clinical signs can occur within 12 hours after eating. In some cases, signs can resolve without treatment in 24 to 48 hours, but patient monitoring is strongly recommended.

Many cases of human food toxicity in pets are accidental. A pet may find and chew on a package of gum or candy, or steal food from a countertop or table. The best way to prevent this is to keep all food items in closed cabinets or in areas that are inaccessible to pets. This may be particularly difficult during the holiday season, when more candy, chocolate, fruit baskets, and other food items are around. During these times, increased vigilance can help prevent pets from finding and eating dangerous foods.

Unfortunately, some cases of food toxicity in pets occur when pets are given a human food that contains a dangerous component. In general, human food items should not be given to pets unless recommended by your veterinarian. Children should also be taught to never give candy, gum, or other human food items to pets. For more information on human foods that are dangerous for pets, visit the ASPCA (American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals) Animal Poison Control Center. If you suspect that your pet has eaten a potentially hazardous item, contact your veterinarian immediately.

SICK CHILDREN: SEND TO SCHOOL OR KEEP HOME?

Deciding when a child is too sick to go to school can be a difficult decision for parents to make. When trying to decide, use the guidelines below.

*GOTOSCHOOL...

If your child has any of the following symptoms, they should probably go to school.

- 1. Sniffles, a runny nose, and a mild cough without a fever.
- 2. Vague complaints of aches, pains or fatigue.
- 3. Single episode of diarrhea or vomiting without any other symptoms.

*STAYATHOME...

If your child has any of the following symptoms, please keep your child at home or make appropriate child care arrangements.

1. APPEARANCE, BEHAVIOR—unusually tired, pale, lack of appetite, difficult to wake, confused, irritable.

2. EYE—thick mucus or pus draining from the eye or pink eye (with pink eye or conjunctivitis you may see a white or yellow discharge, matted eyelids after sleep, eye, pain, and/or redness).

3. FEVER—temperature of 100 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. Remember that a child must be fever free for 24 hours before returning to school.

4. GREENISH NOSE DISCHARGEAND/OR CHRONIC COUGH—should be seen by a health care provider. These conditions may be contagious and require treatment.

5. SORE THROAT—especially with fever or swollen glands in the neck. With strept throat the child may return to school after 24 hours on antibiotics.

6. DIARRHEA—three or more watery stools in a 24 hour period, especially if the child acts or looks ill.

7. VOMITING-vomiting two or more times within the past 24 hours.

8. RASH—body rash, especially with fever or itching. Heat rashes and allergic reactions are not contagious.

9. EAR INFECTIONS WITHOUT FEVER-do not need to be excluded but the child needs to get medical treatment and follow up. Untreated ear infections can cause permanent hearing loss.

10. LICE, SCABIES---children may not return to school until they have been treated and are free of lice and nits (eggs).

11. CHICKEN POX-children must stay at home for five days after the onset of blisters or until all pox are scabbed and dry.

Thank you for acknowledging these symptoms and for your part in helping your child stay healthy and other children stay healthy.

Remember to contact the school if.....

.Your child absent from school. is Please call before 9:00 a.m. to report any absences.

. Your telephone number and/or address has changed. If your child becomes ill or we need to communicate with you, the correct telephone number and address is very important. If you have changed jobs recently, please contact the school with the new information.

. Your child is in need of a heavy coat, gloves, or hat for the winter. Recess will be held outside, weather permitting, and it is much more comfortable and safe for all children to have the appropriate winter wear.

NEW HUNTING/FISHING LICENSE REOUIRED FOR 2013

Hunting and fishing license exemption age changed to 75

Beginning January 1, 2013, Kansas resident hunters and anglers age 65-74 will be required to purchase hunting and fishing licenses. Before this law changed, residents 65 and older were exempt from fishing and hunting license requirements. However, hunters and anglers 65 and older are our fastest growing age group, and changes were necessary to ensure federal aid is not lost and to avoid future budget shortfalls.

Legislation that abolished the exemption provides bargain licenses for seniors. In fact, the best bargain is the Senior Lifetime Pass, a hunting/fishing combination license good for the rest of the holder's life that will cost \$42.50, including vendor and issuance fees. Residents 65 and older can also opt for an annual fishing or hunting license at half the regular price, \$11.50, or an annual hunting/fishing combination license for \$20.50. Residents 75 and older are still exempt.

The new senior licenses, along with all the 2013 licenses and permits will go on sale Dec. 14, and they are valid for the remainder of 2012 and all of 2013. They can be purchased at more than 600 vendors across the state or on-line at www.ksoutdoors.com.
