KANSAS STATE ASSESSMENTS 2011

The Kansas State Board of Education has established curricular standards for all students in the core subjects of reading, mathematics, science, social studies and writing. The standards are general statements of what students should know and be able to do at various grade levels and are provided to schools as a guide in preparing curriculum.

Assessments were developed by the State of Kansas to ensure students are meeting the expectations established by the State Board. Students at all accredited schools in the state are required to participate in the assessments.

Grades three through five will be taking the Math and Reading Kansas State Assessment in February and March. Fourth grade will take the Science Assessment in March.

This time of the school year seems to be the annual test taking time. I would like to pass along some tips that might make these stressful days easier for your students.

Test Taking Tips

- → Get a good night's sleep before the test.
- → Have a nutritious breakfast.
- → Dress Comfortable.
- → Bring all materials you need.
- → Relax...take slow, deep breaths.
- → Follow directions carefully.
- → Read each question.
- → Answer the easy questions first.
- → Move on if you don't know an answer.
- → Mark answers carefully.
- → Review to make sure you've answered every question.
- → Don't change any answers unless you are sure they are wrong.

Please remember to help your child dress according to the weather. The students will have recess outside as the weather permits. Even with inside recess, please send with your child a coat, hat and gloves. If your

5 MULTI-YEAR YOUTH LICENSES OFFER BARGAIN YEARS

New youth hunting and/or fishing licenses available Dec. 15 Beginning Dec. 15, the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks (KDWP) will offer a resident multi-year youth hunting and/or fishing license, providing convenience and saving money for young hunters and anglers. The new youth licenses will be available for resident youth age 16 through 20.

After purchasing the multi-year license, no hunting or fishing license will have to be purchased until the person turns age 21. The one-time purchase, multi-year youth fishing or hunting license is \$40. A one-time purchase multi-year youth fishing/hunting combination license is \$70.

KDWP Secretary Mike Hayden believes the new youth license will encourage young hunters and anglers — and their parents — to get outside and enjoy what Kansas has to offer. "Hunting or fishing with a son or daughter is a wonderful way to build memories and spend time together as these skills are passed from generation-to-generation," Hayden said.

All resident hunters and anglers age 16-64 must purchase an annual hunting, fishing, or combination license, so the new multi-year license is a great bargain. The cost of an annual resident hunting or fishing license is \$20.50. The annual resident combination license is \$38.50. Resident youth will save \$62.50 if they purchase the multi-year fishing or hunting license when they turn 16. A 16-year-old will save \$122.50 if they buy the multi-year combination license.

near future, you may receive a phone call asking you to participate in a short survey and I hope you will take advantage of the opportunity.

The need to solicit your views arose from the strategic planning process that the Board of Education began last fall. It was immediately clear that the changes that were made to the district last year had nearly exhausted all of the recommendations that had come from earlier studies and a need for current information and views was necessary. Thus, the district secured the services of Patron Insight to work with us to develop a survey that would reliably tell us what our patrons wanted our schools to look like.

This process began by identifying individuals who represented a cross section of the district and inviting them to spend a few hours with Patron Insight's Rick Nobles in an informal discussion about the school district. From this meeting, general areas of interest where identified and a survey was developed that would poll our public about topics such as curriculum, facilities, activities, and quality of instruction.

Based upon the number of registered voters in the district, the polling company will need to complete 325 telephone surveys to provide us with results that are statistically accurate to ±4.9%. There will also be an online survey available through our website for anyone that would like to participate but did not receive an opportunity to take the phone survey.

So if your phone rings in the next few weeks and you are asked to participate in a phone survey about your schools, don't hang up. Instead, please take the 10-15 minutes it will take to help us make good decisions for the future of your children and your school district.



In searching for something to put into this article, I found a website, successfullearner@yahoo.com contributed by Elizabeth Hamilton, M.ED, MA, who is a teacher with 20 years of professional experience. She states as follows: "MANY research studies have shown that most students experience a loss in reading skills over summer vacation. However, children who continue to read during the summer months retain their reading skills and perform better academically than those who did not. In addition, educators consider summertime reading very important for maintaining overall literacy skills and for developing good reading habits."

Following these statements, she cited the suggestions for summertime reading activities that can be used to help children sustain their reading skills. I have paraphrased them to fit into this article:



1. Set a good example. Keep reading material around the house, i.e. books of various authors, magazines, newspapers and comics. Keep these stimulating as well as fun.



Take your children to the library at once per week to choose additional reading material.



"...as few as six books during the summer may keep struggling readers from regressing." However, be sure you choose the right books-not too hard or too easy.



Summertime reading should be fun let the kids choose what they want to read.



5. Read aloud with your children or your children read to you every day from a variety of material and vary the setting, i.e., front yard, lake.



For young children or struggling readers, buy books on tape and have the children follow the story in the book as they listen.



Subscribe to children's magazines, i.e. Sports Illustrated for Kids, Highlights for Children, National Geographic. (Person ally, I did this for my step granddaughter in Michigan. We started with Highlights for Children, and have now gone on to National Geographic for Kids. She's now ten. I just checked last week to see if Caron wanted me to renew, and she said definitely, yes, because Caitlin enjoys them quite a lot and even uses them in some of her homework. Needless to say, I renewed it. I also just subscribed to a wildlife magazine for Sierra, Alazay, Tristan and Jax. They should begin receiving it soon.)



Encourage scrapbooking of the kids summer fun and have them write captions for each item. Later this will be fun to reminisce about times past.


