

School Board Member Elections

USD 251 patrons will be voting on five (5) Board of Education positions in the upcoming election on Tuesday, April 2, 2013. The deadline to file for a school board position is Noon on Tuesday, January 22, 2013 at the Election Office at the Lyon County Courthouse. Filing may be by petition with at least 50 qualified signatures or by paying a Five Dollar (\$5.00) filing fee. Forms are available at the Election Office at the Lyon County Courthouse.

The positions up for election are as follows: Position #1 and Position #7 are positions that were filled by Board of Education appointments after the resignations of current members. These appointments may only serve until July 1 of the next odd numbered year when there is an election. Therefore, those individuals who are elected in April for Positions #1 & #7 will fill the unexpired terms of the resigned members, which in this case in from 7/1/2013 through 6/30/2015. Position #4, Position #5, and Position #6 will serve from 7/1/2013 through 6/30/2017.

Any qualified candidate who is a resident of the USD 251 may run for the at-large position. Other qualified candidates must be a resident of USD 251 and member district of the open position. The district boundaries map is available for viewing at the District Office or on the district website at www.usd251.org.

KANSAS STATE ASSESSMENTS 2013

The Kansas State Board of Education has established curricular standards for all students in the core subjects of reading, mathematics, science, social studies and writing. The standards are general statements of what students should know and be able to do at various grade levels and are provided to schools as a guide in preparing curriculum.

Assessments were developed by the State of Kansas to ensure students are meeting the expectations established by the State Board. Students at all accredited schools in the state are required to participate in the assessments.

Grades three through five will be taking the Math and Reading Kansas State Assessment in February and March. Fourth grade will take the Science Assessment in April.

This time of the school year seems to be the annual test taking time. I would like to pass along some tips that might make these stressful days easier for your students.

Test Taking Tips

- ↑ Get a good night's sleep before the test.
- ↑ Have a nutritious breakfast.
- ↑ Dress comfortably.
- ↑ Bring all materials you need.
- ↑ Relax take slow, deep breaths.
- ↑ Follow directions carefully.
- ↑ Read each question.
- ↑ Answer the easy questions first.
- ↑ Move on if you don't know an answer.
- ↑ Mark answers carefully.
- ↑ Review to make sure you've answered every question.
- ↑ Don't change any answers unless you are sure they are wrong.

LAST CHANCE TO BAG A FALL TURKEY

The 2012-2013 fall turkey season is coming to a close, but not before hunters get one last chance to bag their late-season bird. From Jan. 14-31, hunters will have the opportunity to hunt turkey once more in any of the five open units. The next opportunity to hunt turkey won't come again until the beginning of April, so it's time to hit the blind one last time!

Fall permit holders can hunt Units 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6 for fall turkey and may only hunt within the management unit printed on their permits. In addition, hunters must have a Kansas hunting license, unless exempt by law.



Any hunter with a fall turkey permit can purchase as many as three turkey game tags during the fall season, valid in Units 2, 3, 5 and 6. During the fall season, both toms and hens may be taken.

The 2013 spring turkey season will begin with the archery, youth/disabled season, April 1-9, and the firearm season will run April 10 - May 31.


A limited number of spring turkey permits are allocated for Unit 4 (southwest Kansas) and will be available through on-line application. The deadline to apply for a Unit 4 spring turkey permit is Feb. 8, 2013. New this spring season, Unit 4 permits will also be valid in adjacent Units 1, 2 and 5.

2013 Spring turkey permits for Units 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6 are now available for purchase both on-line or at any vendor location through May 30. In addition to a spring turkey permit, hunters may also purchase one turkey game tag, valid in Units 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6. Hunters can save if they purchase the spring turkey permit/game tag combo, which is only available through March 31. After March 31, permit and game tags can be purchased separately at full price. Each spring permit and game tag allows the harvest of one bearded turkey.



Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP)

Make muscle pain a memory with ginger

When Danish researchers asked achy people to jazz up their diets with ginger, it eased muscle and joint pain, swelling and stiffness for up to 63 percent of them within two months. Experts credit ginger's potent compounds called gingerols, which prevent the production of pain-triggering hormones. The study-recommended dose: Add at least 1 teaspoon of dried ginger or 2 teaspoons of chopped ginger to meals daily.

Cure a toothache with cloves

Got a toothache and can't get to the dentist? Gently chewing on a clove can ease tooth pain and gum inflammation for two hours straight, say UCLA researchers. Experts point to a natural compound in cloves called eugenol, a powerful, natural anesthetic. Bonus: Sprinkling a ¼ teaspoon of ground cloves on meals daily may also protect your ticker. Scientists say this simple action helps stabilize blood sugar, plus dampen production of artery-clogging cholesterol in as little as three weeks.

Heal heartburn with cider vinegar

Sip 1 tablespoon of apple cider vinegar mixed with 8 ounces of water before every meal, and experts say you could shut down painful bouts of heartburn in as little as 24 hours. "Cider vinegar is rich in malic and tartaric acids, powerful digestive aids that speed the breakdown of fats and proteins so your stomach can empty quickly, before food washes up into the esophagus, triggering heartburn pain," explains Joseph Brasco, M.D., a gastroenterologist at the Center for Colon and Digestive Diseases in Huntsville, AL.

Erase earaches with garlic

Painful ear infections drive millions of Americans to doctors' offices every year. To cure one fast, just place two drops of warm garlic oil into your aching ear twice daily for five days. This simple treatment can clear up ear infections faster than prescription meds, say experts at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine. Scientists say garlic's active ingredients (germanium, selenium, and sulfur compounds) are naturally toxic to dozens of different pain-causing bacteria. To whip up your own garlic oil gently simmer three cloves of crushed garlic in a half a cup of extra virgin olive oil for two minutes, strain, then refrigerate for up to two weeks, suggests Teresa Graedon, Ph.D., co-author of the book, Best Choices From The People's Pharmacy. For an optimal experience, warm this mix slightly before using so the liquid will feel soothing in your ear canal.

Chase away joint and headache pain with cherries

Latest studies show that at least one in four women is struggling with arthritis, gout or chronic headaches. If you're one of them, a daily bowl of cherries could ease your ache, without the stomach upset so often triggered by today's painkillers, say researchers at East Lansing 's Michigan State University.

Their research reveals that anthocyanins, the compounds that give cherries their brilliant red color, are anti-inflammatories 10 times stronger than ibuprofen and aspirin. "Anthocyanins help shut down the powerful enzymes that kick-start tissue inflammation, so they can prevent, as well as treat, many different kinds of pain," explains Muraleedharan Nair, Ph.D., professor of food science at Michigan State University . His advice: Enjoy 20 cherries (fresh, frozen or dried) daily, then continue until your pain disappears.

Fight tummy troubles with fish

Indigestion, irritable bowel syndrome, inflammatory bowel diseases...if your belly always seems to be in an uproar, try munching 18 ounces of fish weekly to ease your misery. Repeated studies show that the fatty acids in fish, called EPA and DHA, can significantly reduce intestinal inflammation, cramping and belly pain and, in some cases, provide as much relief as corticosteroids and other prescription meds. "EPA and DHA are powerful, natural, side effect-free anti-inflammatories, that can dramatically improve the function of the entire gastrointestinal tract," explains biological chemist Barry Sears, Ph.D., president of the Inflammation Research Foundation in Marblehead, MA. For best results, look for oily fish like salmon, sardines, tuna, mackerel, trout and herring.

Prevent PMS with yogurt

Up to 80 percent of women will struggle with premenstrual syndrome and its uncomfortable symptoms, report Yale researchers. The reason: Their nervous systems are sensitive to the ups and downs in estrogen and progesterone that occur naturally every month. But snacking on 2 cups of yogurt a day can slash these symptoms by 48 percent, say researchers at New York 's Columbia University . "Yogurt is rich in calcium, a mineral that naturally calms the nervous system, preventing painful symptoms even when hormones are in flux," explains Mary Jane Minkin, M.D., a professor of gynecology at Yale University .

Tame chronic pain with turmeric

Studies show turmeric, a popular East Indian spice, is actually three times more effective at easing pain than aspirin, ibuprofen or naproxen, plus it can help relieve chronic pain for 50 percent of people struggling with arthritis and even fibromyalgia, according to Cornell researchers. That's because turmeric's active ingredient, curcumin, naturally shuts down cyclooxygenase 2, an enzyme that churns out a stream of pain-producing hormones, explains nutrition researcher Julian Whitaker, M.D. and author of the book, Reversing Diabetes. The study-recommended dose: Sprinkle 1/4 teaspoon of this spice daily onto any rice, poultry, meat or vegetable dish.

End endometrial pain with oats

The ticket to soothing endometriosis pain could be a daily bowl of oatmeal. Endometriosis occurs when little bits of the uterine lining detach and grow outside of the uterus. Experts say these migrating cells can turn menstruation into a misery, causing so much inflammation that they trigger severe cramping during your period, plus a heavy ache that drags on all month long. Fortunately, scientists say opting for a diet rich in oats can help reduce endometrial pain for up to 60 percent of women within six months. That's because oats don't contain gluten, a trouble-making protein that triggers inflammation in many women, making endometriosis difficult to bear, explains Peter Green, M.D., professor of medicine at Colombia University.

Soothe foot pain with salt

Experts say at least six million Americans develop painful ingrown toenails each year. But regularly soaking ingrown nails in warm salt water baths can cure these painful infections within four days, say scientists at California's Stanford University. The salt in the mix naturally nixes inflammation, plus it's anti-bacterial, so it quickly destroys the germs that cause swelling and pain. Just mix 1 teaspoon of salt into each cup of water, heat to the warmest temperature that you can comfortably stand, and then soak the affected foot area for 20 minutes twice daily, until your infection subsides.

The June 6, 2013 City Council meeting was called to order by Mayor Kevin Sorensen at 7:05 p.m. All council members were present as well as city

employees: Carol Ann Higgins, Tom Corpening, Marion Jones and Treasurer Joyce Wilson. Joyce will have the preliminary 2014 budget for the council's review at the next meeting. Several Reading residents were in attendance.

Rosalie Voorhees presented a proposal for brickwork around the Veterans' Memorial at the park. She would like to include a brick identifying each Reading The united Methodist church will be getting a new minister beginning agreed to the project and asked to be kept aware of the progress.

One resident asked for assistance in removing heavy items from his property during the June clean up week and that was approved. Another resident requested that her damaged culverts be replaced and this was approved. A letter from a resident in regard to a missing check was presented. After review, the council requested that any late fee charged the resident for the relevant period be refunded.

Councilman Hanneman questioned her faulty gas meter and asked if meters were being read each month. It was confirmed that meters are being read each month but in the case of the faulty meter, her usages had been estimated. This broken meter is to be replaced immediately. Marion reported that FEMA extensions had been approved for the few remaining projects yet to be completed.

There was much discussion on moving the gazebo at the park. It was decided to temporarily move it to a spot south and east of the old tennis court until a permanent location could be decided upon. Kevin presented bids for: additional concrete work at the bank and at various locations in the park, as well as electrical work for the new basketball court at the park. The Merry-Go-Round has been dismantled for repair and refurbishment and will be returned to the park once the repair work is complete.

The rental rate for the Community Building was discussed. The half-day rental of \$40 is for anything up to 4 hours. Anything more than that will be considered a full day for \$60. Everyone will be subject to a \$100 refundable deposit as long as the building is adequately cleaned after usage. The council members agreed that no charges would be assessed to Reading churches for the use of the building for community events. Please remember that no animals are permitted in the new Community Building at any time with the exception of service dogs.

The council agreed to provide a basket for the raffle for the June 29 Reading celebration and Fish Fry.
